Additional Information: The Hamden Economic Development Corporation (HEDC) is an independent, 501(c)(4) Corporation that serves as an additional tool for developing the tax base in Hamden and as an advocate for businesses in Town. The Corporation was formed as part of Hamden's long-range Economic Development Plan and is focused on redevelopment of contaminated or under-performing properties. Town of Hamden supported a budget line item for HEDC to cover insurance, marketing, and preliminary assessment costs. The Board of Directors is comprised of eleven members, including business, banking, utility and institutional partners. HEDC facilitated work on expanded inventory information conducted by students at UConn Department of Engineering as part of practicum. Notably, HEDC managed the remediation of CT's largest contaminated residential neighborhood in the Highwood neighborhood in Hamden. Also redeveloped by HEDC with town support, The Business Incubator project is located across the street from the redeveloped Villano Park in the Highwood neighborhood. Documentation Details: Hamden Municipal Budget supported Hamden Economic Development Corporation (HEDC) for this project in fiscal years 2015-2021. HEDC launched a borwnfield redevelopment project at a former school in Hamden's distressed Highwood neighborhood with the concept of turning the site into a "buisness incubator" providing workforce development, small business support, and neighborhood revitalization. Town of Hamden property was transferred to HEDC for this purpose. Borough496, with its history, evolution and purposeful completion, is detailed in Borough Historic Overview document. Borough496 opened in March of 2020. Meanwhile the publicity and great work of HEDC attracted a regional workforce development entity who negotiated a purchase of the Borough and will continue to improve the building and sustain the mission of workforce and business development.

Partners: HEDC was the town's managing partner for this business incubator project. Funding came from the State of CT; Federal Dept of Commerce Economic Development Administration; and CT Historic Tax Credits. In addition, Guilford Savings Bank provided a bridge loan and Eversource Energy company purchased tax credits.
