Documentation Details: 9.4.2 - No Waste Initiative description; CLiCK has partnered with Windham Community Food Network to run waste reduction operations at town events, including Third Thursday, Downtown Country Fair and HopFest. This involves facilitating the use of recyclable containers and cutlery for food, and collection of food leftovers for composting. Stations set up at these events assist attendees to separate their recyclables or compostable waste from their trash. Food waste is taken to CLiCK for composting. Within CLiCK itself, kitchen members have been taught and encouraged to separate their own waste, so that organic materials go to compost rather than into the trash. Events for this initiative started in 2017 and have continued through 2023.

Partners: 9.4.2 - Windham has partnered with CLiCK and the Windham Community Food Network to implement the No Waste initiative. The town partners with Click and Hop Fest by providing a site for the Hop Fest along with collection bins at the fest, and at our Third Thursday events. With Click we provide promotion on our town electronic sign, flyers at town hall, and some grant funding for their programs.

The funding will go towards the towns diversion program, which focuses on helping people out of shelters and into permanent and safe housing. Windham Region No Freeze applied for \$8,000, while the Community Health Resources applied for \$64,000. The funds will be put into paying for transportation costs, birth certificates, and cell phones to help people apply for housing.
