

12.4 Provide or Mobilize Resources to Address Homelessness

Objective

Provide or mobilize resources to address homelessness within your municipality, regionally and/or statewide.

Complementary Actions:

- Strengthen Municipal Workforce Capacity to Address Homelessness
- Increase Public Awareness and Support for Efforts to End Homelessness
- Collect and Share Homelessness Data

What to Do

Note: The United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) defines literal homelessness as follows: "Individuals and families who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence and includes a subset for an individual who is exiting an institution where he or she resided for 90 days or less and who resided in an emergency shelter or a place not meant for human habitation immediately before entering that institution." "Unsheltered" refers to individuals and families who meet this definition and are not currently residing in a shelter. 1. Commit dedicated funding to directly address and prevent homelessness. Funding would ideally be directed as part of the municipal budget. Other funding pathways include grants that your municipality had a key role in obtaining, or through other fundraising, including crowdfunding. Funding must have been secured or committed in the last three years. (10 points)

Strategies may include:

- Appropriating municipal funds towards a "homeless services" line item in the municipal budget to support
 flexible financial assistance, shelters or other crisis services, shelter diversion staffing, compensation for
 those with lived experience of homelessness who participate in the municipal Task Force or in community
 conversations and public forums, or other uses identified in partnership with your region's Coordinated
 Access Network (CANs);
- Obtaining Community development Block Grant Small Cities grants to fund staffing to Coordinated Access Network appointments and shelter diversion assistance;
- Obtaining block grant funding from the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development and allocate funds to Coordinate Access Networks and homelessness service providers;
- Securing Public Housing Authority units and/or voucher set-asides for individuals referred by the Coordinated Access Network; or
- Providing diversion and rapid exit funds to people experiencing or at imminent risk of homelessness in your region's Coordinated Access Network (CAN) or in Connecticut statewide.

Note: Any other raising of funds to be re-granted through this Action is not eligible for funding by the

Sustainable CT Community Match Fund.

Submit: A completed <u>worksheet 1</u> and additional documentation relevant according to the funding strategy, such as a copy of the municipal budget with the relevant line item funded, a letter notifying the municipality of the receipt of grant funds, a screenshot of the email altering your CAN contact and the Connecticut Coalition to End Homelessness of funds raised and a screenshot of your completed drive on your crowdfunding platform, or, in the case of vouchers and housing units, a copy of the municipalities Public Housing Authority Administrative plan.

2. Ensure that individuals experiencing literal homelessness within your municipality have locations where they can safely access services and/or stay 24 hours a day, especially in extreme weather. (15 points)

Strategies may include:

- In consultation with your regional Coordinated Access Network (CAN), identify and designate confidential space(s) and location(s) within the municipality where CAN appointments can be conducted; or
- Make available shelters, warming centers, overflow shelters, or drop-in centers. Special consideration should be given to transportation options to and from facilities and where individuals can access lockers and shower facilities; or
- Improve or initiate coordination with local domestic violence advocates and with domestic violence shelter systems, with support from your CAN; or
- Improve or initiate coordination with state and local social services departments, with support from your CAN

Submit: A completed worksheet 2. Strategies must be active and current.
