Objective

Increase the knowledge-base and effectiveness of your local boards and commissions.

What to Do

The more you do, the more points you earn.

- 1. Train members of your land use commission(s) to at regularly scheduled or special meetings of the commission(s), as listed below. The training must have taken place in the last three years. (5 points)
 - The training must be provided to your municipal planning commission, zoning commission, combined planning and zoning commission, or zoning board of appeals.
 - The regularly scheduled or special meeting must be open to the public.
 - The training must total at least one hour of training each calendar year and may be provided during one commission meeting or multiple commission meetings.
 - The land use training topic(s) must align with the <u>Connecticut Office of Policy and Management (OPM)</u>
 <u>Land Use Training Guidelines.</u>
 - The training may be: in-person, virtual, hybrid (based on how your commission currently meets) and the trainer could be a live trainer, or video training.

Submit: A completed <u>worksheet 1</u>, a list of all commissioners who attended the meeting where training took place, and at least one piece of documentation related to the training meeting (such as meeting minutes, a presentation, or similar).

- 2. Send members of your Inlands Wetlands Commission to training and discuss learnings. The training must have taken place in the last three years. **(up to 10 points)**
 - **a.** Send at least three members of your Inlands Wetlands Commission to <u>CT DEEP's Training for Municipal Inland Wetlands Agencies</u>. **(5 points)**
 - **b.** During a regularly scheduled, public meeting of the commission, hold a discussion of what commissioners learned in their training and how the content of the training can be incorporated into the commission's work and responsibilities. **(5 points)**

Submit: For Action 8.3.2a: A list of Inland Wetland Commissioners who attended the training; date of attendance; and an agenda or brief description of the content covered. For Action 8.3.2b: Meeting minutes showing the commission's discussion of training content.
