Objective

Support youth-led sustainability initiatives and projects in your community.

What to Do

1. Support youth-led sustainability projects in your community. Each project supported under this Action is eligible for **5 points, up to 15 points**. Critical elements of this action include:
 - Projects must align with objective **and/or** action steps of a Sustainable CT action. For each Sustainable CT action completed as a result of a youth-led project, your town is eligible for points under this Action in addition to points for the action implemented.
 - To earn points under this action, the youth leading the project must be 21 years old or younger.
 - Projects may begin in a classroom setting or as part of a school assignment, but they must have an implementation element (i.e. should not just be a research report).
 - Projects must be publicly accessible. Projects on school property, even if accessible to the wider community, are not eligible for points under this action.
 - Youth leaders and projects do not need to be affiliated with a school or community organization.
 - Municipal support must be current, and your municipality must have provided support to the youth-led sustainability project(s) in the last three years.

Your municipality must actively support projects. Examples of ways your municipality can support these projects are listed below:

- Municipal staff work with youth to share their knowledge, expertise, or other relevant information that support the completion of a project.
- Physical space for the project, such as municipal open space for the creation of a community garden.
- Funding to support all or a portion of the project.
