Objective

Build and strengthen municipal processes to be more inclusive, cohesive, and representative of all community members, now and in the future. These system-wide, structural changes are an important step in creating open and equitable communities.

Submit: Apply the <u>Sustainable CT Equity Toolkit</u> to one or more actions in your submission and submit a narrative that includes the submission requirements outlined on page 13. Please note, you must also submit for the new action(s) to which the Toolkit was applied in the corresponding submission page(s).

For **2019 Bronze Certification**, you must complete the Sustainable CT Equity Toolkit for one Sustainable CT action that you are submitting for certification.

For **2019 Silver Certification**, you must complete the Sustainable CT Equity Toolkit for at least three Sustainable CT actions that you are submitting for certification.

Credit for Past Action

For spring certification, count back from February 1st of the current year. For fall certification, count back from August 1st of the current year. For further clarification on determining if your prior work is eligible to earn points, <u>click here.</u>
