

## 12.3 Collect and Share Homelessness Data



# **Action Updates**

## **Objective**

Collect information on all individuals and families experiencing homelessness as a first step in connecting to services and supports.

**Complementary Actions:** 

- <u>Strengthen Municipal Workforce Capacity to Address Homelessness</u>
- Increase Public Awareness and Support for Efforts to End Homelessness
- Provide or Mobilize Resources to Address Homelessness

### What to Do

**Note:** The United States Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) defines literal homelessness as follows: "Individuals and families who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence and includes a subset for an individual who is exiting an institution where he or she resided for 90 days or less and who resided in an emergency shelter or a place not meant for human habitation immediately before entering that institution." **"Unsheltered"** refers to individuals and families who meet this definition and are not currently residing in a shelter.  In collaboration with your Coordinated Access Network (CAN), have your homelessness municipal liaison, Task Force, or other relevant municipal staff compile collected information on all individuals and families in your municipality experiencing literal homelessness, including those experiencing unsheltered homelessness. Ideally, municipal staff and/or residents will support the effort to collect this data. This information will help <u>Coordinated Access Networks (CANs)</u> with supporting municipalities in connecting residents experiencing homelessness with services. (10 points)

**Note:** Any documentation submitted for this action must have names and/or other identifying information removed.

**Submit:** The number of individuals, families, and youth experiencing homelessness each year for the past two years in your municipality and a description of your municipality's role in obtaining that data. **Do not submit names of individuals and/or other identifying information.**
