We represent here our original and ongoing market which is ever developing with new advertising schemes and new vendors. We also have a second spin off on a larger lot that publicizes itself separately and at this point can be considered a second action. We do have a directory of local businesses as well at <http://explorecornwallct.com/business-directory/> The first market advertises through a weekly newsletter and campaigns for BUYING LOCAL with the recurring message, "Support your neighbor, strengthen your local economy!" As a small town, Cornwall only has one store that sells food, called the Cornwall Country Market, which sells locally-grown products. There are also a few restaurants that sell local products, which are Pearly's Farmhouse Cafe and RSVP French Kitchen. The Trinity Retreat Center sells local syrup and uses local products in their cooking. These are all listed in the document titled "1.3.1 Inventory and Map of Local Businesses - divided into sectors.pdf". They are listed as numbers 27, 2, 10, and 11 respectively. The municipality serves as a host for these markets. The Co-op market takes place in the town hall's lawn, or inside the town hall if it is raining.

**Additional Information:** A large event which should be noted but was outside of the lookback period for this action was the Going Green Fair. Held in 2017, it celebrated a decade of work by the town of Cornwall. Our introductory welcome was provided by our first selectman. Features included a Farmer's Market Extra-Orinaire with a local food cafe, a Keynote Speaker (Lynn Stoddard from the Institute for Sustainable Energy), Vendors and Exhibits, an Exhibit from Energy Star shipped from DC about household energy conservation, an Energy Efficient Car Show, the Electric Bill Management Booth, and a panel discussion of 4 key sustainability organizations that tackle Land Conservation (Cornwall Conservation Trust), Watershed Preservation (HVA), Housing (CHC) and Energy (CETF). The side shows were a house tour, the opening of a new hiking trail and the initiation of a children's theater project to spread the work about energy conservation. Each of these could be submitted as separate actions. This was sponsored by the Cornwall Association, a group dedicated to presenting current issues in town. They decided that breaking this down into separate bits would serve the community better. They thought that the occasion to assemble key groups together had a cross fertilization benefit not often experienced in town. They also felt very good about the student engagement in that the events attracted all ages as actors as well as participants.
