Additional Information: The Town's stormwater education program includes several techniques to disseminate information to residents. First, the Town's website will be maintained with current and relevant information on why stormwater management is important and what they can do to protect the Town's watersheds. The Town also utilizes time during annual "Government Academy" presentations, where departments "teach" a class to a group of residents interested in learning more about how municipal government works, to explain various watershed protection strategies. Meetings with the Hockanum River Committee and Manchester Public Schools are also being planned. There are also several documents that the Town created to explain stormwater/watershed, including the Stormwater LID and Sustainable Design Checklist, which instructs residents and developers on how to best incorporate LID techniques, which limits stormwater runoff and thus promotes watershed health.

Documentation Details: 3.6.1: Reduce municipal water use by adopting best management practices (10 points) The attachment titled "2025 - 3.6.1 -Keeney School Plumbing Fixtures" demonstrates that the Town, as recently as 2024, was working with vendors on school renovation projects that were able to deliver highefficiency bathroom and water-related fixtures, as can be seen on the third page, where it is specified that the toilet fixtures "Meets definition of HET (High Efficiency Toilet) when used with a high efficiency flush valve (1.1 gpf - 1.6 gpf or 1.28/1.1 gpf dual flush)". Similarly, the attachment titled "2025 - 3.6.1 - New Library Building Specs" demonstrates that as a best practice the Town requires, as part of the bid process, the submission of high-efficiency fixtures, as evidenced by the inclusion of the highlighted language on page 11: "Water Consumption: Maximum 1.6 gallons [1.28 gallons] per flush." This flush measurement meets the WaterSense standard of 1.28 gallons per flush. 3.6.2: Develop a drought communications plan (10 points) In 2020 the Town formally developed a drought communications plan with the assistance of a consultant (Milone & MacBroom). As part of the larger Staged Drought Response Plan, and including references to the existing Water Supply Emergency Ordinance (page 15), specific communications steps can be found on pages 5 (Water Supply Alert), 6 (Water Supply Advisory) and 7 (Water Supply Emergency) of the document titled "2025 - 3.6.2 - Manchester Drought Response Plan". Those communicative measures include contacting DPH, pushing the notice to media, mailing letters to all large users or all users in extreme cases, and including information in mailed bills. In addition, the Town's Water Supply Emergency Ordinance lists the communication steps necessary after the declaration, including posting in a newspaper within three days. While this plan and the emergency ordinance are more than three years old, they are still utilized, as can be seen in the attachment titled "2025 - 3.6.2 - Water Supply Notice on Website", where the Town posts regular updates on the status of the water supply and reservoirs in general. An example of communications posted to the Town's website from 2024 can be found within the attachment titled "2025 - 3.6.3 - Water Supply Emergency Website Example". 3.6.3: Develop and pass a drought restriction ordinance (20 points) Article III of the Town's code (Water Supply Emergencies) was adopted in 2002. In the attached document titled "2025 - 3.6.3 - Drought Restriction Ordinance", the ordinance outlines the stages of water supply emergencies, public notice requirements, and the powers of the Board and Town Manger during such events. The State of Connecticut's DPH is referenced multiple times, including reference to the fact that the Town's "Emergency Contingency Plan...has been reviewed and approved by the State of Connecticut Department of Public Health, Water Supply Section"

Also linked on that page is the Town's Sustainable Design and Low Impact Development Guidelines, which aim to encourage LID implementation for new development projects in town.

Provide proactive maintenance to existing trees within your municipality, such as a pruning program for existing trees. The Town's pruning and tree maintenance efforts can be quantified by the Town's performance measurement program, which tracks the amount of hours spent by DPW staff on Tree Maintenance operations. These figures (1,600 hours in FY24, for example) can be seen in the attachment titled "2025 - 3.9.3 - Tree Maintenance Hours". Additional costs above staff time can be found in the attachment titled "2025 - 3.9.3 - Tree Maintenance Costs", in which the Town's Parks and Recreation Facilities Manager outlines that between \$50,000 and \$75,000 is spent annually on tree pruning and removal. A brief conformation and description of that program can be found in the attachment titled "2025 - 3.9.3 - Tree Pruning Program Description" 2. Complete a tree planting program in your municipality that increases tree equity and/or access to green space. A complete list of new tree plantings from between 2021 and 2024 can be found in the attachment titled "2025 - 3.9.3 - Tree Planting Inventory 2021 to 2024" (roughly 227 trees in that span). Several of those plantings were in socioeconomically disadvantaged neighborhoods that are more highly impacted by urban heat island effect, such as the Spruce Street neighborhood, the West Side, New State Road, and the Main Street areas. In addition, Manchester participated in a tree giveaway for residents planned in conjunction with Eversource and the Arbor Day Foundation. The event information and listing on the Arbor Day Foundation website can be found in the attachments titled "2025 - 3.9.3 - Eversource and Arbor Day Foundation Tree Giveaway Event" and "2025 -3.9.3 - Arbor Day Foundation Manchester Listing". This event distributed roughly 200 trees to residents, free of charge, with the stated goal of improving the Town's tree canopy.

The Downtown Arts and Culture Grant Program (https://www.manchesterct.gov/Government/Latest-News/Downtown-Arts-Culture-Mini-Grant-Program) provides funding to residents and nonprofit groups to encourage and support initiatives, events and installations that contribute to the vibrancy and engaging atmosphere in the Downtown area. Work\_Space is a dynamic Coworking, Meeting & Gallery space owned and operated by the Town of Manchester, which hold events, art shows, open mic nights, and other arts-focused content. There is also an Artist in Residence staffed there. The final Budget Resolutions from FY24 and FY25 are attached and titled "2025 - 4.2.3 -FY24/FY25 Town Budget with Arts Items Highlighted", and each has the Arts-focused funding lines highlighted. The Town's Zoning Regulations define Agri-Tourism (a new inclusion in the regulations as of 2019) as "an activity conducted on a farm of 2 acres or greater intended to attract visitors to a farm that members of the general public or special interest groups are allowed to view or participate in..." with distinctions between high and low-impact agri-tourism activities. The only restrictions on low-impact agritourism activities are the size of the plot/farm (min.2 acres), line of sight from the street, and parking considerations. The restrictions on high-impact activities include all of those listed for low-impact, with the addition of maintaining the ability of the plot to function as a productive farm, light and noise considerations, and all special exemption criteria in Article IV, Sec. 20. Without our funding there would be no outreach or data. 2) Providing dedicated MPD staff support to MACC's weekly homeless outreach efforts. 3) Providing 100% of the funding for non-congregate winter sheltering. 4) Facilitating referrals, collaboration and data sharing between MACC, Journey Home, town social workers and other local/regional local stakeholders such as shelter providers.

Documentation Details: ARPA SUSTAINABILITY GRANT PROGRAM The final report for the ARPA Sustainability Grant Program, which includes a description of all funded partners, award amounts, and activities funded via the Town, is attached as "2025 - 13.1.1 - ARPA Sustainability Grant Final Report". A copy of the evaluation criteria for the grant program is attached separately as "2025 - 13.1.1 - ARPA Sustainability Grant Evaluation Criteria", this is the rubric by which applicants were graded by the evaluation committee. The original 2020 recommendation to the Manchester Board of Directors for a "community-grant program" is attached as "2025 - 13.1.1 - ARPA Sustainability Grant Initial Recommendation to Board". In that letter from the Sustainability Commission, the group advocated for a set-aside of ARPA funds to be used for providing "funding to community-based organizations in Manchester with a focus on resilience and sustainability." with a stated focus on "community groups...Youth development organizations...Organizations that build social capital...with a focus on disenfranchised communities and those with higher social vulnerability... [and]...Organizations that value and prioritize environmental sustainability and climate change mitigation and adaptation". Due in part to this advocacy by the Sustainability Commission, the Board of Directors allocated \$500,000 on October 4, 2022 in ARPA funds towards a grant program that was to be run through the Commission. The group used a portion of those funds to hire a grants management consultant, and worked with the Town's Budget and Finance Offices to develop grant materials for the application process, regular monitoring, and ultimately the attached final report. There were two "rounds" of funding/applications, with the first deadline for applicants being November 2023, and the second being due in March 2024. A copy of the presentation made to the Board of Directors in December 2023 can be found attached as "2025 - 13.1.1 - ARPA Sustainability Grant Presentation to Board" which outlines the intent and timeline in more detail. A list and detailed descriptions of the funded partners and the initiatives supported through this process can be found in the attached "2025 - 13.1.1 - ARPA Sustainability Grant Final Report" but it includes funding to build a community garden space, expanding a food pantry at a LGBTQfocused health collective, housing infrastructure for residents with disabilities and related group homes, support for a senior-focused tech center, a car seats for kids program, and an invasive plant removal project, among others. It is the hope of the Commission that this program becomes a model for the Town and potentially the region on an equitable way to disburse federal or other funds in a targeted, impactful way: https://www.manchesterct.gov/Government/Town-Leadership/Boards-Commissions-Committees/Sustainable-ManchesterX/ARPA-Sustainability-Grant-Program IT TAKES A VILLAGE MATERNITY PROGRAM More program info available at: https://www.manchesterct.gov/Government/Latest-News/lt-Takes-a-Village-Postpartum-Program Following the allocation of ARPA funds by the Board of Directors, the Maternal Health Working Group was formed, comprising of doulas, healthcare professionals, town employees, fatherhood specialists, educators, parents, and other Manchester residents. This collaborative effort aimed to create a comprehensive financial and social assistance pilot program that supports families during the postpartum phase. Initially, the program intended to provide a one-time box of baby supplies for new families, however, identification of barriers during monthly meetings highlighted a critical lack of structural support and informal social networks for new parents. This prompted the group to design a program that fosters a nurturing environment akin to having an extended family present during post-birth recovery. Formal partnerships were formed with town businesses and organizations, such as Eastern Connecticut Health Network (ECHN)'s Family Development Center and Women's Wellness Center, October Kitchen, Swiss Cleaners, Real Dads Forever, and Multiple Perspectives, to create a robust support network for families in need. Each provides unique supportive and evidence-based integrative health services free of charge to participants, such as wash and fold laundry delivery service, frozen meals, fatherhood support, postpartum massages, and acupuncture. The It Takes a Village Program will track 100 families throughout the duration of six weeks post-childbirth to provide wraparound support in the form of vouchers for services, financial support, mentorship, and education to address challenges such as isolation and loneliness, financial stress, and lack of support during the postpartum period. For six weeks, participants will be connected to these services while having empowering conversations with a member of the Town's care team. Each week has a dedicated topic tailored to the postpartum experience such as community support, coordination of integrative health services, support systems, and more. Benefits include weekly financial assistance up to 6 weeks totaling \$600, education and resources to address postpartum challenges, mentorship for fathers, and a postpartum care bundle. To qualify, participants must be 18 and older, onset of 32 weeks pregnant and up, or up to 8 weeks postpartum. Applicants must live, work, or receive pregnancy-related services in Manchester.
