How to Print

If using Adobe Acrobat (Highly Recommended):

How to Use the Sustainable CT Action Flashcards

Suggested Sustainable CT Planning Activity

This activity can help familiarize your community with the Sustainable CT actions, as well as help you get a sense of what actions you might already be working on or have completed.

- 1. Gather your Sustainability Team and/or municipal department representatives and sit around a table.
- 2. Label five areas on the table: "Completed," "Planned," "Ongoing," "Not Interested," and "Follow Up Needed."
- 3. Distribute cards randomly and evenly to all participants.
- 4. Give participants a few minutes to read through their cards.
- 5. Go around the table with each participant reading/describing each action in his/her hand and collectively assign a location in one of the five labeled areas.
- 6. Place each card in its respective pile.
- 7. Work together until all the cards are on the table.
